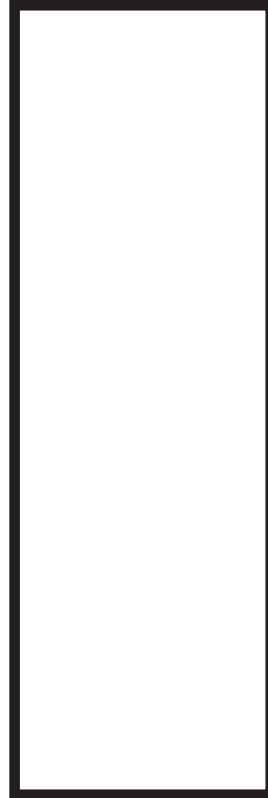

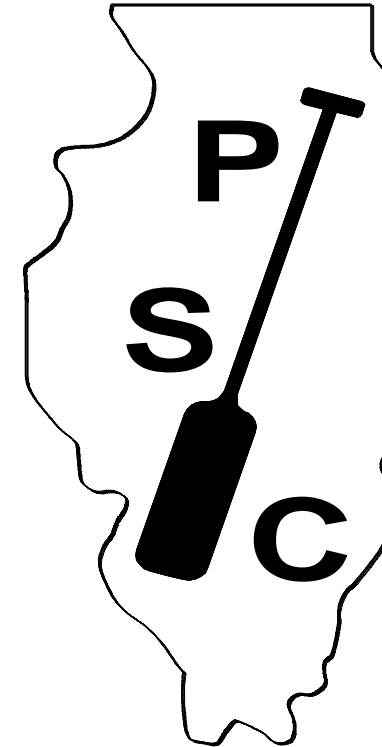

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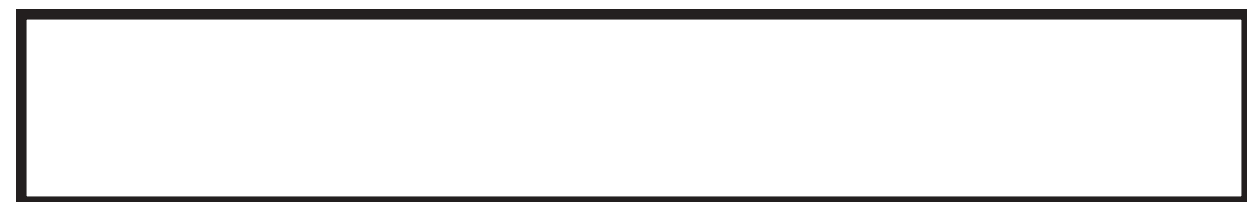

least to us. We camped five nights at the Clear Lake State Park campground which was handy for the first three rivers paddled.

The first choice was the Ocqueoc. Michigan has suffered like Illinois with a dry August. The Ocqueoc was dry. We shifted to the Black, a clear quick stream like most Michigan rivers. This was a good warm-up river with little to challenge paddling skills. The only drawback was a lack of places to pull over for a break due to steep banks and heavy forest growth. Monday rained all day so we took the opportunity to scout put-ins and take-outs on some other rivers. Ed racked up almost 300 miles driving all day.

Next we paddled the Pigeon, a faster stream than the Black with some maneuvering opportunities. A few tight bends and some small rock gardens made for a nice paddle. On Wednesday we paddled the Sturgeon. What a surprise. Fast current, nonstop turns with deadfall. Except for a 150 yard rock garden it was sort of like paddling the 9mile to 6mile section of the Little Manistee for twice the distance. We all were tired after this day on the river.

Thursday we broke camp, paddled a section of Thunder Bay River, and drove down to Sterling to finish off the week. The Thunder Bay was nice with a couple of ledges but not much of a challenge. A lot of private homes along the way made this the least scenic of the five rivers we paddled.

Thursday through Saturday we camped at the River View Campground on the banks of the Rifle River which we canoed on Friday and Saturday. This turned out to be a great little river with a rapid on Friday's

section that consisted of four ledges. The first three drops were easy to negotiate, but the third wasn't. We had each picked a different route and all three of us got hung up on the rocks. After dislodging and scouting from our boats we saw a possible route on far river right that might have worked. Clear, narrow somewhat fast, and scenic this river rates high on my list.

Mike left us on Saturday but shifted us before he left. Ed and I put-in so we could do the rapid from the day before and paddle far enough to do the other rapid described in our Mich. Rivers book. We paddled to the first rapid, through the first two ledges and pulled off to scout. Looking through binoculars we could not see a way to get to the deep water we saw the day before on the right, so we tried to find a way on the left and center and both got stuck again. But the second rapid made up for it. The nicest fast water on the trip it was a 150-200 yard rock garden reminiscent of something on section II of the Wolf River. We picked our way through and if we had more time Ed would have poled back up and run it again. **Bob Kane**

27-28-Sept Kickapoo River, WI

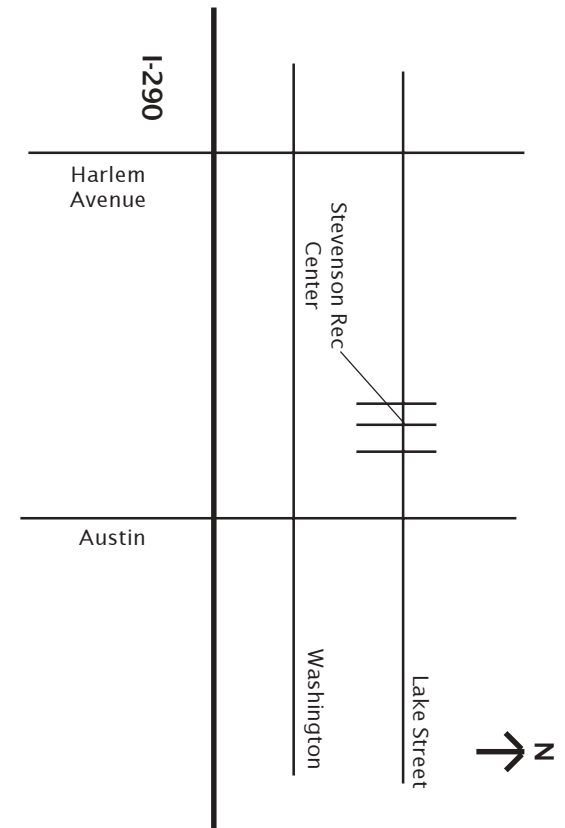
21-27-Sept Michigan Rivers

Wisconsin Assembly BILL 506 -

May limit use of Wisconsin streams.

Editor note: I have received several notifications from individuals and forwarded write-ups from other paddling clubs with this information

This alert is to all paddlers about a proposed bill in the Wisconsin Legislature that would seriously affect paddling in the state.

WI Representative Scott Gunderson has introduced Assembly Bill 506 which seeks to change the definition of 'navigable waters' or 'navigable waterway' to mean any body of water capable of supporting

an occupied watercraft six months in a calendar year. The same definition would apply to lakes. Under the current definition, a 'navigable waterway' must only be capable of supporting an occupied watercraft one day a year. The bill has been criticized in committee for having the effect of removing one-third of Wisconsin's stream miles from the public

It is a river who wields the brush, and it is the same river who, before I can bring my friends to view his work, erases it forever from human view. After that it exists only in the mind's eye. Like other artists, my river is temperamental; there is no predicting when the mood to paint will come upon him, or how long it will last. But in late spring and summer, when the great white fleets cruise the sky for day after flawless day, it is worth paddling among the sandbars just to see whether

Caroling in Canoes and Kayaks

This is an invitation to join the 5th Annual "Caroling in Canoes and Kayaks" on the Chicago River on Sunday, December 14th at 3:00PM.

We will put-in at a floating dock on the east end of the Ogden Slip. Drop your boat(s) on the east side of McClurg Court one half-block south of Illinois Street. We'll have a little on-the-water singing practice at 3:30PM and then head out to carol at the Michigan Ave. Bridge from (about) 4:30pm to 4:40pm and State Street Bridge from 4:50 to 5:00pm. The whole trip should take about two hours. We'll return to Ogden Slip and celebrate at Dick's Last Resort next to the take-out.

While there are parking lots nearby, they are not cheap so you may want to drop your boat by Ogden Slip and then find meter parking further away.....remember to bring enough quarters if you do.

Not only is this event a heck of a lot more fun than last minute holiday shopping, it raises public awareness of the local paddling community and the increasing non-motorized and year round recreational use of the Chicago River. And, we usually get some tape of us on that night's 10pm TV news!

Of course, SAFETY must be a concern for everyone participating in a public event, on cold water, at night. You MUST be wearing a PFD on this trip as we will be in full sight of the public and media and there are continuous vertical walls with few ladders throughout this entire section of the river.

A split red/green bow light and 360 degree white stern light are recommended for all boats. Of course, dressing to swim and/or bringing a change of clothes in a drybag is a standard safety precaution for any paddling trip.

We will have waterproof song sheets for all and the first 15 people to RSVP get free Santa hats. It is also a good idea to RSVP so that you can get a last minute (Sunday 9AM) emailed notice if the weather does not cooperate and we have to cancel or change things.

Those who decorate their boats greatly added to the color and fun of this trip. Anyone who can bring and play a musical instrument (on the water) gets extra credit! If anyone wants to come up with "paddler adapted" words or verses for traditional carols I'll re-broadcast them here and we'll add them to the song

sheets. We're also looking for a volunteer conductor to lead the "singing".

Although Ogden Slip is not a public put-in & take-out, we are being allowed to access the river for this event with the kind permission of the property owner, the MCL
