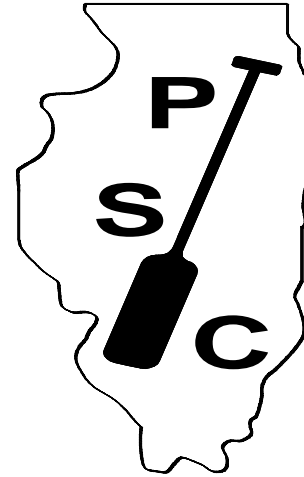

July 23-24

Baraboo River

This trip was an unusual one, but nobody complained. The weather forecast for the weekend was high 90's both days. The river level was low and slow (200 cfs). Despite that, everyone was up for a weekend of paddling.

Saturday, we launched from North Freedom. We were barely out of sight of the put-in when it began to rain. It wasn't a serious rain (yet), but it continued intermittently all morning and into the afternoon. (Note to self: Even if there is no rain forecasted, put a small tarp in the dump bag.) At about 2:00, it all broke loose. The sky turned black as slate and it started to rain hard enough to rate a mention in the Bible. When the lightning got too close for comfort, we got off the river and took shelter in a farmer's tool shed. After about fifteen minutes, we got back on the river, none the worse for the experience, and finished the trip at Haskins Park without incident. AS for the upper 90's, the rain kept it in the upper 70's.

On Sunday, we launched from Haskins Park and paddled down to Luebke Landing, with a stop for ice cream at the Boo restaurant. The river was up a little due to the rain. If you like the clear, cool spring water on the Mecan, it's better on the Upper Iowa. If you like easy access, ample parking, a good current and magnificent scenery, the Upper Iowa is for you.

Here is a river hazard that I experienced, and thought I would share...

On a Friday morning I poled my canoe up stream from the Nippersink canoe launch on route. 12. The Nippersink runs through a couple of dairy farms and it is not uncommon to paddle through a herd of cows. After turning the canoe around back towards the car, I notice a bull (complete with nose ring) trotting down the river bank, towards me. The faster I paddled the faster the bull would trot. The bull came into the river. As he was sniffing the bow I jumped out of the canoe. He started to hoof the ground and snort at me. With my paddle and pole overhead I tried to make myself as big as possible. While keeping the canoe between the bull and myself I kept backing up. 100 feet away was the wires that cross the river to keep the cows in. Once close the the wires I was able to dive underneath. Before I left an agitated bull behind, I notice a group of cows coming down the river to witness the potential onslaught. This is a river hazard I thought I would never be facing. **Bob Fenger**

June 25 Kishwaukee River, IL

River was flowing at 150 CFS (mean flow for this date: 550 CFS). This low flow caused an otherwise avoidable strainer at 4.5 miles (between Perryville and Mulford bridges) to become quite tempting—and hazardous. Some bottom scraping and boat dragging was required. Eagles seen on earlier trips did not show up, unfortunately. **Al Donaldson**

June 26 DuPage River, IL

Although the DuPage was low in the midst on this historical drought, we paddled the entire trip with few scrapes. Only once was it necessary to get out. The ninety degree weather was tolerable until the last two miles when we paddled in an oven; lunch was ideal. Most paddlers brought chairs and the folding picnic table proved to be a great addition. Some did want to leave; but as the train passed through, it prompted us to start the next part of the trip! Many paddlers enjoyed going through the DuPage's wild meanders south of Shepley Road. July 2 Sugar River, WI

The Sugar River was bittersweet because of a myriad of strainers and deadfall that forced us to zigzag from bank to bank. The low water level added to the trip's difficulty. Occasionally we had to get out and pull our crafts over sandbars. Ideal weather conditions made this a splendid day. Few birds were sighted but many fish could be seen in the clear water. A sandbar midway through the trip made a good lunch stop. The eight kayaks and one canoe on this trip might portend the future of PSC(&K). **Glenn Jensen**

July 3 Sugar River, WI

Nice water, nice day. Saw hawk, great blue heron, and woodchuck. Nice lunch stop at sandbar on river left about 4 miles into the 7-mile trip. There was one low spot but no strainers that currently require portaging on this stretch as they do upstream. USGS gage at Brodhead WI today was at 220 cfs, 0.67' height. **George Stenitzer**

June 18 Salt Creek, IL

Our trip began with a workshop on stream monitoring that lasted for approx. one hour. After a brief introduction we all put on boots, grabbed a d-frame net, and head out to the riffle zones below the dam to gather samples of benthic macro invertebrates. We then identified out "catch" and filled in our recording sheets. We came up with a high "fair" to low "good" water quality rating for Salt Creek. Surprisingly, very few "poor" rating macro invertebrates were found. After a short car shift we hit the water - six kayaks and five canoes at approx. 11 am.

The water level was extremely low with lots of scraping, dragging, portaging, and slow going. Our "short" trip that should have taken about two and a half hours ended up taking up four and a half! Three canoes and one kayak tipped over to add to the experience (No, it wasn't me, but I came darned close one time!) Over all, most of the eight members and six guests had a very enjoyable time. Although traffic could be heard most of the time, the river itself traveled through forest preserves the entire way making you feel you were way out in the country.

The long carry from the take out to our cars was made much easier by a group of young guys who took pity on all of us and helped tote the boats from the river and helped get them all on our cars. **Melinda Tury**

June 18-19 Baraboo River, WI

When we arrived at the put-in on Saturday, we were greeted by the raucous cry of two sand hill cranes. The cranes flew off pteradactyl-like, but we took it as a good omen for the trip. We weren't disappointed.

Saturday's section, North Freedom to Haskins Park, was a very pleasant trip down a winding, rural river. Much of it was under the canopy, Some of it so much so that it was as if we were paddling through an arboreal tunnel. Wildlife sightings included herons, hawks, various other birds that I couldn't identify, muskrats, a close encounter with two beavers and a dairy herd, which watched us go by with keen, if slow witted interest. Lunch was at a particularly pleasant park, served by a floating dock. Afternoon gave way to a wider river and a set of mild riffles, which some of us ran and others played in. Shortly after the riffles, we arrived at Haskins Park.

On Sunday we launched from Haskins Park. Almost immediately we encountered several sets of riffles. Again, we played in them for a little while, then moved on to the next set and played some more. After a while, the riffles gave way to a peaceful, gentle river that flowed out of downtown Baraboo, past Circus World Museum and back into the country. Sunday was a short day, and we were all on the road by 1:00.

All in all, the river offered a variety of scenery and conditions - all of them good. The put-ins and take-outs were all clean and very convenient, and the shade kept us cool. The riffles made things interesting - they are easily navigated by anyone who can keep his boat pointed down-river.
